Session Abstract

Professional services networks and other multi-firm and multi-jurisdictional organizations are built on a premise of collaboration yet are highly challenged when it comes to driving the kind of true collaboration that accomplishes their strategic goals.

It was easier when many of these organizations began as they were solely focused on members exchanging referrals to protect client relationships and defend against competitors who were geographically situated where another member was not. Over the years the strategic reasons to belong to a network have changed, with the focus being on joint business development and joint working on client matters as much as it is on the exchange of referrals. Whereas referrals work where there is collegiality, the ability to remain independent yet able to work on high value and complex client matters requires actual collaboration.
